Five Ideas to Help Get You Started Writing Contemporary Haiku

Golden Haiku follows the Haiku Society of America's guidelines for modern haiku, which does not require the traditional 5-7-5 structure. Removing the strict structural requirements for syllables frees the author to use evocative language to capture a moment or expression of beauty in a short, descriptive verse.

1. A haiku is a short poem. There are many variations (in Japanese, too!) when it comes to structure, so keep an open mind.

2. Avoid unneeded words. Haiku strip superfluous words and syllables for the goal of simplicity.

3. Bring your reader into your experience. It's okay to play with your haiku and adapt it to best capture the moment.

4. Read a lot of haiku. It will help you figure out what you like and what works for you.

5. Write a lot of haiku. Writing haiku is as much about the joy of writing and sharing as it is about the product.
